This month's featured fly is Nick's Soft Hackle PMD Emerger.

Nick Nicklas worked for Blue Ribbon Flies in Montana for over thirty years and developed this fly there. However, that being said, it is an effective fly on the Little Truckee. One of our local club experts on the LT, Jeff Bakker, swears by them even in the fall when the fish are keying on big streamers and egg patterns.

I know it looks shiny, but Jeff ties them with gold holographic tinsel and in size 18 for the LT. You can also substitute the ostrich with dubbing to match.

One afternoon on our first club outing to the LT, we hit a PMD hatch in the late afternoon with a pod of huge trout at the chow line. Some of us were lucky enough to get hooked up with PMD imitations. All in all, you have to be prepared for anything at any given time when you are on the water.

Membership Information



Although the greenback cutthroat trout Oncorhynchus clarki stomias has been the focus of conservation efforts for more than half a century—starting when the once-lost species was "rediscovered" in a remote part of Rocky Mountain National Park—a series of genetic studies in the 2000's produced some blockbuster findings that threw all previous work into question. It turns out that many of the fish that both state biologists and anglers had considered greenbacks were, in fact, not greenbacks at all. <u>More ...</u>

An Assessment of Urban Water Demand Forecasts in California

In California, urban per capita water demand has declined dramatically over the past several decades, driven in part by greater uptake of water-efficient devices. These reductions have important implications for estimating future water demand. However, failure to account for the long-term trend of declining per capita water demand has led to routine overestimation of future water demand. This can lead to unnecessary and costly investment in unneeded infrastructure and new sources of supply, higher costs, and adverse environmental impacts. *More ...*

DELTA FLOWS: Is the Delta Conveyance Project a Good Bet?

Just how realistic is this Delta Conveyance Project in 2020? Will this star-crossed project be another COVID-19 victim?

The Delta Conveyance Project (DCP) appears to have even less support than former Governor Jerry Brown's California WaterFix. The Sacramento News & Review reported in recent weeks that Kathryn Mallon, the executive director of both the Delta Conveyance Design and Construction Authority and the Delta Construction Finance Authority, earns twice the salary as Governor Gavin Newsom—and Newsom is earning his (by comparison) with having to prepare a new state budget and oversee the state's response to the pandemic. <u>More...</u>

Swinging Streamers on Big Water

Most streamer fisherman out there would agree that pounding the river banks with a streamer will catch trout just about anywhere.

If you're willing to put in the time and hard work eventually you'll be rewarded with a big fish. During high water flows on rivers where habitat is insufficient out in the main river, many trout will relocate to the banks where they can use the irregular banks and it's abundant cover to shelter themselves out of the excessive current. There next move, once they've gotten to the banks, is to find prime ambush spots where they can easily pick off prey moving by. This is why casting to the bank and ripping streamers back to the boat is so effective. You're repeatedly putting your streamer right in the kitchen where good numbers of fish will be feeding. <u>More ...</u>

Four friends embark on the adventure of a lifetime in search of a wildness seldom found in the urban sprawl of the Anthropocene. In an effort to better understand America's first sport fish, and the eastern seaboard's only native trout, filmmakers Chase and Aimee Bartee lead a canoe expedition into North America's last great and unexplored frontier; Labrador. There's only one problem, they've never even paddled a canoe before.

Surviving: The Story of the Lahontan Cutthroat Trout

The Pyramid Lake Lahontan Cutthroat Trout was declared extinct in the 1940's as a result of a badly planned diversion dam on the Truckee River. Built with no consideration of the downstream Indigenous Peoples of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe and their cherished homeland, the dam desiccated the lake and destroyed the habitat of its native fish. However, the fish made a near impossible return, aided by the efforts of biologists, tribal litigators, and a carpenter.

This documentary was completed as part of a graduate study in media innovation at the University of Nevada, Reno. It premiered at the Wild and Scenic Film Festival in Nevada City, California in January of 2019.

Understanding Caddis, Mayfly, Midge & Stonefly Hatches

This fascinating video explores the details of insect hatches and their importance to trout as a source of food. The four key hatches Tom Rosenbauer discusses are: Mayflies, Midge, Caddis and Stoneflies.

Northern California Council Fly Fishers International News

Northern California Council, FFI September 2020 Report to Clubs Mark Rockwell, President

I am hoping that all of you are safe after this terrible fire month. As I write much of the North State is on fire, including near our old home, Grass Valley. These are tough times!



The picture at left is from last year when I took a group to visit Senator Feinstein's staff in Los Angles to discuss water management in Calif. We discussed the importance of protecting watersheds, not sending more water south, and protecting the Bay-Delta from added diversions. We left documentation showing the Bay-Delta needs more flows not less. NCCFFI has the ability to communicate with elected officials on behalf of our clubs and members.

Happy hour Zoom meeting - August 27 we pulled together club Presidents in a Zoom call to talk about the impacts to clubs of COVID-19. How are clubs coping and sharing ideas on ways to help members stay connected with each other, and have fun. As I write this we have not had the meeting, but we are all looking forward to sharing, and I'm sure all members will benefit from this effort.

Communication News: NCCFFI is working with Fly Fishers International and Brickhouse Creative to develop a new website platform for our council, and possibly FFI itself. We are in process now, and Brickhouse is now working on the prototype that will be shared with us soon. It is our hope to have a new website up and running before the end of the year. It will be more informative, have added features, and be more user friendly and have current information available to clubs and members. It will also link to the our Facebook page, and will carry our Council documents that can be accessed by members. Letters we've written and sign onto will be stored and can be accessed. We will notify everyone when it is up and running. We have worked most of this year to evaluate our communication and to develop new and better methods to communicate with clubs and members.

Conservation: We are working on two very important issues. 1) Clean Water Act section 401 water quality certification below federally licensed dams. This relates to all major rivers in California. The state and some NGOs have filed suit in federal court to block the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) from waiving the need to meet state water quality standards when dams are relicensed for the next 40-50 years. We are working with the NGO community and the State on this suit. Meeting State water quality standards is a must for healthy fisheries in the rivers and in the Delta. 2) We are working with Flycasters of San Jose to move forward on an agreement started in 2003 to recover and stabilize the fishery in 3 streams in Santa Clara Valley, south of San Jose. We are working with partners at Cal Trout, Trout Unlimited, PCFFA and Santa Clara Valley Water to move the recovery along. Negotiations on supportive legislation is in progress to help with funding.

Education: A real benefit of membership with FFI for clubs is the opportunity for funding help via conservation and education grants. Flycasters of San Jose is starting up a new effort to do Trout in the Classroom in its region, and needed funding to help them with a \$5,500 2 year project to up-grade equipment and other needs to get the program going. Flycasters did the request, the NCCFFI Board voted to support. It went to FFI and was reviewed by the Education committee. Result: Flycasters has received a \$3,000 grant for their project.

I sincerely hope September is a month of no fires and good fishing for all!

If you are into big fish, they're here. The lake is best fished from a float craft or tubes, etc. Also available is the upper Owens River where it is said that this time of year the big fish run upstream to spawn.
