The Fly Box "Fonzi Fly: A favorite Winter Fly Pattern" By Bob Fujimura

Winter is a favorite season for fishing our local tailwaters – fewer anglers with diverse opportunities for great steelhead and resident rainbow trout fishing. Although nymphing is still the most productive method of fly fishing, swinging or dead drifting



salmon alvein or fry patterns can be a very enjoyable change of pace. My favorite salmon fry pattern is the 'Fonzi Fry' introduced to me in a Delta Fly Fishers' tying session taught by Joe Balderston. I usually swing this pattern using either an intermediate sinking line or from an intermediate sinking leader attached to a floating line. It is an effective technique when Chinook salmon fry are rearing in the Mokelumne, American, or Yuba Rivers. When larger trout have been feeding selectively on these baby salmon, their takes can be violent, and break offs are common until you let the fish set themselves. Instructions on how to tie this fly can be found on this link: <u>http://www.current-works.com/how-to-tie-fly/fonzifry/</u>. You can easily modify the recipe to suit your interests – I use some marabou in the 'wing' to enhance its movement or replace the body dubbing with metallic tinsel for a classic wet fly look.

In 1973 Gerald Meral and David Kay were among a small group of leaders who formed Friends of the River to save the Stanislaus River from New Melones Dam. What Lies Beneath

There's a world unseen below the surface. The riverbed weaves a course and directs the currents, giving shape to its valley. Water swirls behind rocks. It moves north and south against submerged logs. The stream blends and separates, merges and divides again as vertical columns rise and fall — and all of this in three dimensions.

Few people understand what lies beneath the riffled, whitewater breakup or the smooth glide of a river's surface. Many drive, jog or walk past the water, or they admire the winding bends from a scenic overlook, high above on the neighboring ridge. But the angler knows. He intuitively learns the push and pull of the currents as he wades upstream. She easily predicts the speed of a run by the depth of its color. Because as analytical anglers, we are forever in thought.

The fly fisher who drifts and strips flies under the surface is immersed in a mental puzzle, forming an imaginary map featuring the unseen parts of a river. That picture is colored by educated guesses. And it's informed by things we learn with each cast of the nymph, streamer or wet fly. When our fly drifts slower than expected, we take note. And the mental map shifts a bit. *More here ...*


