... White Pines Lake Outing

The club is hosting students from our Fly Fishing 101 class for a day on the water at White Pines Lake near Arnold, CA on Blagen Rd. off Highway 4. A locals favorite, White Pines Lake is situated along the Ebbetts Pass National Scenic Byway. It's a small, picturesque, high country lake. Instructors from the class as well as volunteers will coach the students as they apply what they learned in class. SFF members are welcome to attend this open outing and pitch in to assist the newcomers if they wish. Or just fish! Everyone is welcome.

We'll start @ 8am. About 9:30 we'll break for coffee and donuts. After morning break, we hope students and members will pair up and fish together. We assume some students will want to stay @ White Pines for the day. Other students will be anxious to try some moving water. Optimally, members will take a student and mentor them a bit on local water. There are no planned fishing routes, but hopefully, a few members will be excited to share some favorite water with a newbie. At noon volunteer/mentoring duties are done.

White Pines fishing notes from a friend who lived there for years: A go-to is a woolly bugger in size 12 or 14, black or green, sometimes with some sparkle. Also, the bugger can be fished with a dropper, such as a Prince Nymph, Copper John, or midge pattern. Also, Sparrow nymphs, Parachute Adams, BWOs, ants, caddis, and beadhead nymphs.

Where and when does Yuba Fest take place?

There will be many opportunities to gain experience and improve your fly fishing skills at Yuba Fest 2024.


- Fly tiers to show you patterns to use on the Lower Yuba and demonstrate their expert tying techniques.


Will there be food and beverages available at the event?

FLY FISHER'S TOOLBOX Exercising Good Fly Fishing Stewardship By Mark Likos, NCCFFI director

Thankfully, the fly fishers I've observed in the field through the years have been decent stewards of the sport. I fish mostly with fellow club members that fortunately were trained from their beginning how to safely fight, land and release their trout. Most of us are primarily catch & release but don't frown on those that take an occasional fish when regulations allow. It's important to preserve the habitat we have for future seasons and for future generations.

I strongly suggest you carry some sort of accurate thermometer in the field. I saw a professional flyfisher some years ago using a really cool digital type of thermometer. I had to have one. It cost over \$30. It didn't last a year. I bought another one because it was so cool, it lasted less time than the first one... I found a common submersible type for under \$5.00 (on Amazon) that takes a beating and works as accurately as the digital, which makes it way cooler to me now.

Trout need 3 things to survive: Clean, cold, oxygenated water, a regular food source and shelter where they can rest & avoid predators.

Most species of trout do best in temperatures in the mid-fifties. They feed, spawn and typically do well at these temperatures when they have a food source and shelter they need. Science tells us colder water carries more oxygen than warmer water. When water temperatures rise, trout can adapt for short periods of time, but will have a much higher mortality rate when stressed due to the low levels of oxygen in the water.

Many if not most articles I've read on 'when-to-stop' fishing for trout, say to stay below 67°F or 68°F. I like to stay below 65°F as my personal upper limit. In summer that will frequently mean getting out on the water early for the cooler morning temperatures, avoiding midday highs (and maybe the afternoons), and come back for the cooler evening angling, IF the water temperature dictates.

If you're fishing a still-water venue, consider switching from the coldwater trout to the warm-water bass or bluegill that are hardier in warmer environments.

When you are lucky enough to have hooked a trout, try to minimize the fight. This is an art in itself. We need to be able to judge the size of the trout we

are fighting so as not to over-fight and break it off. Keep it off the bottom where he may find aquatic weeds or a tree stump to wrap around. Bring it to net in an economical way to where we don't over-stress the animal to point it will die after releasing. A tall order I understand. I try not to fight the trout just to be fighting it. I try to stay sensitive to the variables at hand and net the fish in a timely manner. I suggest always using a net, so you can always keep the fish in the water.

I've read a few articles about the mortality of trout kept in the net and released (after reviving) have a much better chance of surviving the fight than those held up out of the water to de-fly and/or for pictures. If you must take a picture, make sure all is ready before you lift the fish up, minimizing the time the fish is out of water, understanding that animal's mortality is rising with every second it's out of the water. The goal should be to net the fish, remove the fly, revive and release it. with the trout never leaving the water to maximize that animals' chances of survival after landing.

A critical point some anglers overlook is reviving the fish before releasing it. When you get the fish to net, it's exhausted from the fight. Many fish die soon after leaving the net if you don't give it a chance to revive first. After removing the fly, while the fish is still in the net, turn it upstream so the water is flowing into its face, through its gills for a time to let the fish regain some strength before turning it loose. Getting in the habit of letting that fish catch its breath, calm down a bit before releasing, will lower the mortality rate significantly.

So,

- Get & carry an aquatic thermometer while out on the water.
- Take frequent temperature measurements throughout the day to be cognizant of where the water temperature you are currently fishing is in relation to the known mortality borders you want to avoid.
- Always land trout with a net, attempt to keep the trout in the water at all times.
- If you must move the fish out of water for a picture or any reason, plan the move to minimize the air exposure to minimize the animal's mortality rate.
- Lastly, be a good steward of the sport and teach others to be responsible stewards also.


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Kern River Goldens and Bows


