Seining Outing

Wednesday, June 10 | 6:00 p.m.

The Fly Fishing 101 class will be conducting a seining outing on the Tuolumne River to collect and identify aquatic insects ("bugs") that are an important food source for trout. This hands-on experience helps anglers better understand aquatic ecosystems and select effective fly patterns.

All club members are welcome to attend.

Location

We will meet on the wide gravel shoulder along Yosemite Boulevard (Highway 132), between Basso Bridge and La Grange.

What We'll Be Doing

After we arrive, we will walk to the river where we will wade into the water. Club member John Driver will demonstrate proper scientific sampling techniques for collecting aquatic invertebrates. Participants will also have the opportunity to practice informal sampling methods that can be used to identify likely fly patterns for fishing local waters.

We expect to spend approximately 90 minutes seining and examining aquatic insects.

While this outing is part of the FF101 curriculum, participation is voluntary and all club members are encouraged to join us.

What to Bring

- Waders or wet-wading gear
 - Synthetic shorts or pants, synthetic socks, and old athletic shoes work well for wet wading.

- Long pants and socks can provide additional protection from ticks.
- Consider bringing dry clothes for the drive home.
- A wading staff (recommended for safety)
- A fishing net and 5-gallon paint strainer, if you have them
 - Paint strainers are available at most hardware and home improvement stores.
 - A limited number of loaners will be available.
- A valid California fishing license and steelhead report card if you plan to fish after the outing

Interested in Fishing Afterwards?

Members who would like to fish after the seining session can get assistance setting up leaders and flies for either an indicator rig or a hopper-dropper rig. Several experienced club members will be available to help during the club meeting and Dutch oven dinner on Tuesday, June 9.

In addition, nymph flies will be provided to participants following the seining outing.

Come join us for an educational evening on the river and learn more about the insects that drive trout feeding behavior.

Bring your appetite and your favorite fishing stories—we look forward to seeing you there!

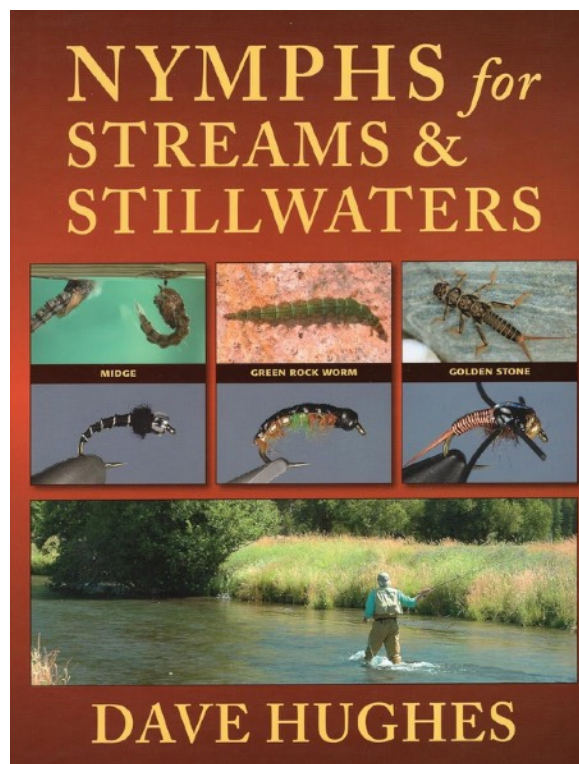

It's a great opportunity to test your skills, learn a few tips, and enjoy some friendly competition before we gather for dinner and after dinner.

Flytyers' Corner - Michael Hewitt

This month I'm covering a book from Dave Hughes, editor of the *Flyfishing & Tying Journal*. He's also the author of more than 20 books about fly fishing for trout, including today's focus, *Nymphs for Streams and Stillwaters*. Given that a trout's diet relies heavily on subsurface food this is a great resource for tyer's who want to improve or expand their nymph repertoire.

Hughes makes the subject understandable and offers information designed to improve your tying and your fishing. *Nymphs for Streams and Stillwaters* is a step-by-step reference to tying and fishing nymphs, focusing on the relationship between naturals and their imitations, and between imitations and trout. What nymphs should you spend your time tying? How do you tie them? Where and how to fish them in order to catch more trout? You'll find good answers here.

Nymphs for Streams and Stillwaters has four sections. An introduction section titled "The Way Nymphing Shapes Itself" sets the foundation for the three remaining sections, "Searching Nymphs for Moving Water," "Imitative Nymphs for Moving Water," and "Nymphs for Stillwater." Feeding trout can be more selective in lakes and ponds, and stillwater food sources frequently differ from those in rivers and streams.



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Included are step-by-step instructions for 112 useful nymph flies and more than 900 photos of natural nymphs, their imitations, and steps in tying those flies.

My copy shows a list price of \$59.95, but I bought it off eBay for \$10.93. There are good deals on fly tying books out there if you keep your eyes open. This was definitely a bargain and a nice addition to my tying library.

But when I finally held that little fish in my wet hands, something shifted.

It wasn't about size.

It was about belonging.

For one shimmering moment on that famous river, I wasn't just someone learning to fly fish anymore.

I was a fly fisher.

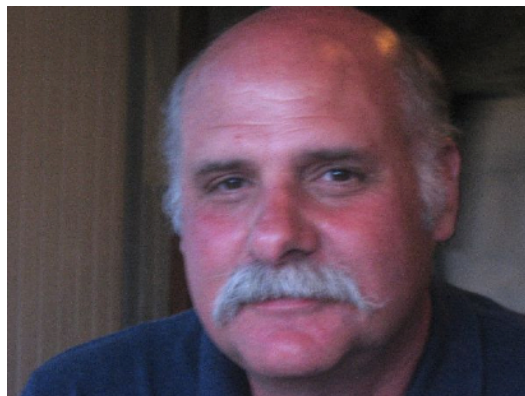

I am hearing lots of reports of great fishing opportunities...from the Lower Sacramento River for Trout & Striped Bass, the Yuba River for Shad, the Truckee River for Trout, Bullard's Bar and foothill lakes for Bass, etc. So, it's definitely time to get out and go fly-fishing...Reach out to your fishing buddies, or your favorite guide, or join in on your fly-fishing club fishout and get out on the water!

If you are up to volunteer the Bay-Delta Flows Coalition will host a Lobby Day in Sacramento on Wednesday, June 3. This will be a great opportunity to meet State legislators and staff and to get more familiar with the political process. Last year we derailed an attempt by Governor Newsom to include trailer bills on must-pass legislation

that would have exempted water quality control plans from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and fast-tracked the Delta Tunnel. Travel

Approximately 4½-hour drive to the Marine Corps Mountain Warfare Training Center via Highway 108.

We will pass through the base to access Wolf Creek.

Fishing Opportunity

Wolf Creek – Lahontan Cutthroat Trout

Return Home

Travel home via Highway 108, approximately 3 hours.

Optional Extended Stay:

Leavitt Meadows and Sonora Bridge Campgrounds are both nearby and provide access to the Walker River for those wishing to extend their trip.

What to Bring

Camping Equipment

- All necessary camping gear
- Trailers are strongly discouraged. Forest roads are steep, narrow, and winding. Long trailers are prohibited in some areas.

Food and Water

- Breakfasts, lunches, and snacks
- Plenty of drinking water

Fishing Gear

- Lightweight stream-fishing equipment
- A 7½-foot, 2–4 weight rod is ideal for these small streams and fish
- Tenkara rods are also excellent choices
- Stream thermometer to help monitor water temperatures and minimize stress on fish

Recommended Flies

- Light-colored Catskill-style dry flies (such as Adams patterns)
- Purple Haze
- Smaller sizes (#16 and similar)
- Floating ant patterns
- Nymphs should also be productive

Additional Gear

- Wet-wading gear or waders
- Camera or smartphone to document your catches
- A full tank of gas before departure
- Your favorite road-trip playlist

Altitude Considerations

We will be fishing and camping at elevations above 7,000 feet. Be sure to bring anything you need to remain comfortable and hydrated at altitude.

We look forward to a memorable weekend of fishing, camping, and pursuing some of California's most beautiful native trout.

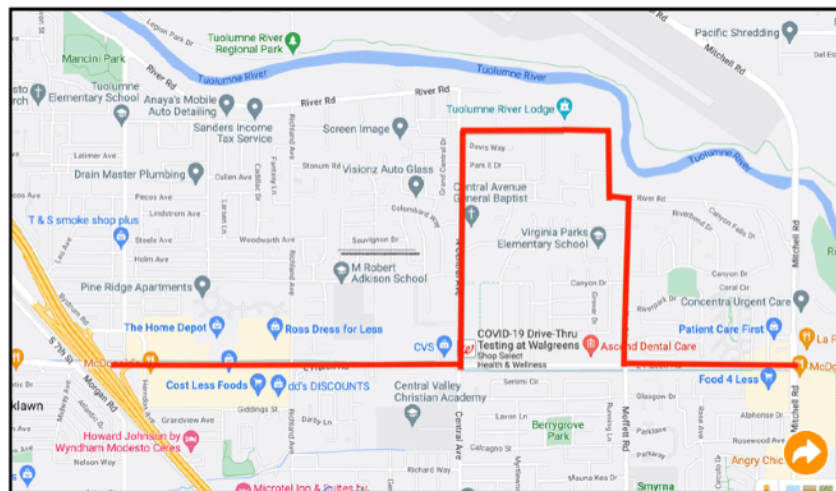

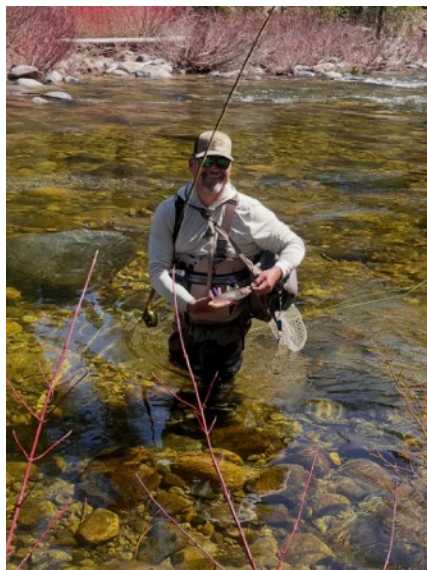

From Mitchell Rd take Hatch Rd west to Moffett Rd. Right on Moffett to River Rd. Left on River Rd.



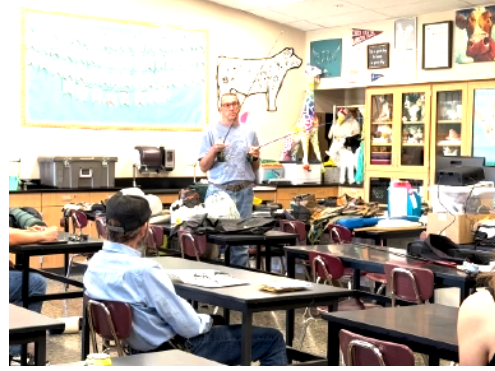
Around the Rivers
